Care

Sitting down in November creating profiles for hampers allows time for us as a care team to review and reflect on the practical and financial needs of the individuals we work with. It is striking how intertwined these care needs are with emotional stresses and burdens that are experienced throughout the year and are magnified with Christmas pressures. The past months have been marked with bereavement, poor health, addiction issues and isolation for many we work with, a stark contrast to the idyllic Christmas picture so often presented. We spend time with clients listening to challenges and working together to find practical solutions to make these stresses feel a little less overwhelming.


In 2015, there has been an increase in new HIV diagnosis as a result of a wider media promotion and availability of testing through A&E services. Subsequently, in the last quarter we received referrals of newly diagnosed clients and supported family members through HIV and sexual health testing. Work has taken place at home with newly diagnosed clients, their partners and family members to dispel misconceptions and educate about the reality of what it means to live with HIV. This has included a holistic review of lifestyle choices with new medication regimes, accompaniment to clinics, challenging personal beliefs about HIV and stigma, and resourcing individuals with relevant information based on their personal needs.



the care team work hard to ensure clients continue to be supported regardless of where this takes place. Practical resourcing in the form of applications for medical cards, liaising with clinics for appointments, empowering individuals to have honest conversations with doctors and medical staff, and encouraging adherence to medication are all vital to maintaining consistent support.

Thanks to the HSE Respite Care Grant Scheme, the last few months have also included some well-needed respite time for several families in the [Cavan Centre](#), as well as mid-term youth activities and one-to-one and small group teen mentoring, particularly in a pastoral capacity.

As we close out 2015 with our annual hamper deliveries, we recognise the value of striking the balance between practical support and emotional care. The hampers provide a wonderful opportunity for churches, schools and individuals to donate and bless others in such a touching and practical way, while also allowing for an end of year space to spend meaningful time with clients and their families.



As always we thank you for your prayers and support during this year and look forward to sharing more about our work in 2016.

In 2016 ACET Ireland are launching a new initiative for parents and those that work with parents. The **Parent/Teen Communication Skills Course** will be specifically tailored for migrant communities for whom there are particular challenges in terms of raising teenagers within a cultural context different from that in which parents grew up. The course will be delivered in conjunction with staff of **ACET Northern Ireland** and is accredited to the **Open College Network (NI)** at Level 2 (similar to FETAC Level 5-6).
