1916, HIV and the local church

Richard Carson has been supporting and training local church leaders in the North East Inner City of Dublin. This work, funded by the MAC AIDS Fund and Dublin City Council among others, takes place in partnership with **Acts of Compassion Projects** led by Rev Amos Ngugi. Areas addressed together include HIV, listening skills, supporting the person living with HIV, and HIV testing. We also took the opportunity to join with many of the church leaders on Easter Sunday on O'Connell Street, before the State commemorations began, for their annual open-air service.

Care Work

In the past few months, our care work has focussed on:

- **Medical support:** particular clients have been motivated to engage with testing, adhere to new and existing medication regimes and attend clinic appointments with the support and encouragement of care staff.
- **New referrals:** needs range from housing, health and migration issues. While building new relationships we have also assisted with applications and interagency work, alongside the appropriate health focus.
- **Linking with extended family members of existing clients:** as a result of already established relationships, we have been able to provide immediate support in areas of health promotion, advocacy for social justice issues and boundaries within family units.
- **Mid-term and Easter respite:** visits to museums, the zoo, Malahide Castle and Farmleigh provided a welcome break for families and individuals. Creating memories also helps strengthen intergenerational relationships.

MATILDA PROJECT

Zimbabwe update:



Hopes for rain have dwindled as the driest wet season in 35 years is drawing to a close, with President Mugabe declaring a state of disaster in rural areas, due to drought. Unlike previous years, the drought has also affected Zambia, Malawi, South Africa, Botswana and Mozambique, causing food prices to rapidly increase. A regional shortage of maize means the school breakfasts cost \$210 more in March than February; price increases are expected to continue.

Matilda Project's **Wendy Phillips** visited the Matilda partners in February, along with ACET volunteer Colm Geraghty, Zeph Phillips and Hannah Boles. The trip was filled with useful discussions about various aspects of the work, meetings with old friends, and exchanging of blessings.

Matilda Breakfast Programme has 8 schools. At Silozwe Primary School, each cauldron holds 300 or more mugs of porridge. Of the 5 cooks, 4 were grandmothers. 2,700 kg of mealie meal is cooked and served each month. 39% of pupils in one school were orphans or vulnerable children. 2,700 children eat breakfast every day.

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
