Our inclination is that the powerful should remain in power, yet this upside-down proposal is the only way forward.

In the Christmas story we encounter an Empire set on counting its power and wealth through a census. But the power that will bring real transformation is hidden in the margins. The tiny community shaped around a scandalised teenage pregnancy beckons "a new and glorious morn." The stories in our newsletter offer, we hope, a glimpse of such new beginnings.

And as we go into 2024, a new year, we hope that each of you will experience new beginnings and that we will all see real transformation in our communities and in our lives.

On a chilly December afternoon, the **Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar TD**, unveiled the new HIV and AIDS Monument in Phoenix Park which remembers and honours all those who have died and those that cared for them. The successful proposal entitled 'Embraced Loop' uses an abstracted form of the HIV symbol, the red ribbon, to create an embrace of solidarity. It was designed by artists **Anaisa Franco** and **Michael R. DiCarlo**. There are already early plans for events to take place in 2024 at the monument to remember specific communities and ACET staff are looking forward to spending time there with clients in the new year.

The monument is in the People's Park of the Phoenix Park, very close to Chesterfield Avenue.

### 'Equal: Check + Chat' — a new mobile HIV and STI screening service

A joint initiative of **HIV Ireland** and **ACET**, the 'Equal: Check + Chat' van has been designed to facilitate friendly, efficient testing options, free at the point of use to multiple communities. The project broadens our reach around

Leinster where sections of our community experience barriers to accessing faceto-face rapid HIV and other STI screening services.

Having the van pull up at a local community centre to

offer out-of-hours, accessible and culturally appropriate screening services, provided in a friendly non-judgmental way, can only improve rates of testing for HIV and STIs among traditionally underserved communities.

This project is funded through **Gilead Sciences' "Zeroing In"** community grants programme, with additional

funding from GSK-ViiV and Certified Proud.



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
